Spring Cleaning Not Just for Looks

According to our local Fire Chief, the potential for fire in Port Ludlow is literally right under our noses and right in our backyards.

With winter behind us and the arrival of spring, it's time to think about outdoor spring cleaning activities. Last winter the unusual winds and rain produced an abundance of fall-down from the trees. Not only is the fall-down debris unsightly, but it is fuel for a fire. Each spring, the strategy for cleaning yards of winter fall-down should involve two basic goals:

- Make the yard look nice.
- Make the yard safer from fire danger.

We have all watched our television screens with horror as views of fires in the Spokane area are showing walls of fire burning everything in its path with no regard for wildlife, homes or people in the way. Do you watch these disasters thinking those terrible things happen only in drier climates? Should the surrounding evergreens give us a complacent feeling that we are safe from such a fast-moving disaster?

Homeowners can take an active role in protecting their property. In fact, anyone who has taken precautionary actions before the small spark of fire is wind-fed into a multi-acre wildfire, has effectively reduced the risk of losing home and property. Plans for survival must be made long before the smoke above the tree line is visible. Following are some suggestions from Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue:

Make an exterior inspection of your home and look for overhanging tree limbs. Remove this fuel from your roof.

Flammable material lodged alongside your house and outbuildings, under foundations, decks and eaves should be removed.

Electrical lines not under ground should be kept clear of trees and shrubs. If the power company is informed of any hazards, they will usually remove them.

Keep firewood piled away from buildings, but do not store downhill from the house. Heat from burning, piled wood can be intense.

House and outbuilding roofs are critical in surviving a fire and deserve special consideration. Remove all storm debris from your roofs.

Wood shingles and shakes are nice to look at and seem to fit into the Northwest look, but having them is like piling firewood on your home! Cleaning of storm litter and treating them is essential in reducing the fire danger to your home.

Gutters filled with leaves and debris will make a fire right at home. Clean your gutters and eaves of all storm debris.

Spring cleaning is not just for looks. Your life and property depend on cleaning winter fall-down debris for fire safety, too. For more information regarding any fire prevention issues for your home, contact Port Ludlow Fire & Rescue at 437-2899.

If you believe we are safe from fire in our community because of the rain and high humidity, consider Port Saint Lucie, Florida.

On April 16th, 1999 forty eight homes were destroyed by fire. Port Saint Lucie is on the west coast of Florida near the Everglades.

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Seattle's Pier 50 Expansion Planned

News published in other publications that can affect the lives of Port Ludlow citizens are reprinted by the Village Voice as a service to our readers. The following article recently appeared in "Inland Crossings," a monthly publication of the Washington State Ferry system. Reprinted with permission.

With plans under way to expand passenger-only ferry service to new destinations at Kingston and Southworth, an expansion project is needed at Seattle's Pier 50 to handle the new ferries and crowds.

Terminal designers recently unveiled plans for improvements to the Pier 50 passenger-only facility, located just south of the auto ferry terminal at Colman Dock. The new facility will feature an additional "L float" to allow bow loading and unloading, a new ticket and waiting area, and a covered walkway to keep passengers protected from poor weather, says Colman Dock project manager Tim King.

Pier 50 will be the home base for the new fleet of passenger-only ferries. The Chinook is already in service between Seattle and Bremerton, and a sister ship, the Snohomish, is now being built in Anacortes. State officials are expected to authorize funding for four or five similar ferries. As they come into service, the older passenger ferries—Skagit, Tyee and Kalama—will be phased out or re-assigned.

The construction schedule calls for the new ticket and waiting area to be completed by late 1999 or early 2000. Construction of the new floats will take a little longer. The improvements should come as good news for passengers who use Pier 50 now to travel to Bremerton and Vashon. Gone will be the portable toilets, cramped waiting area and limited ticket-selling windows.

In their place will be a roomier, heated and air-conditioned building with real restrooms, offices for ferry employees and enough ticket windows—three tollbooths and two prepaid gates—to quickly move people through.

This new facility is intended to accommodate ferry passengers for about a five-year period, says King. Long-range plans call for a completely new passenger-only facility near Colman Dock, most likely at Pier 48, to meet needs over the next 20 years.

"This temporary facility is a significant upgrade over what we have today," comments King. "It will be capable of

handling crowds for a five-year period and is intended to be a facility with a reasonable cost and appropriate size for this area while we study long-term options."

UGN Pays Tribute to Dedicated Volunteer

On March 29th, one of the truly dedicated community volunteers passed away. John Seaberg served for the past eight years as the United Good Neighbor Port Ludlow Community Leader. Under John with the able assistance of his wife Ruth, the yearly UGN campaign met or exceeded the goal established for the Port Ludlow campaign. Both John and Ruth put in many hours maintaining mailing lists, preparing letters, soliciting other volunteers, and a number of other things that underscored their contribution toward making Port Ludlow a great place to live.

UGN is the United Way organization in Jefferson County and serves over 20 health and social service agencies in the county. UGN helps fund over 30 programs in those agencies.

Campaign results in Port Ludlow are tracked by a thermometer placed at the intersection of Oak Bay and Paradise Bay roads.

In the words of the UGN board, "It is with heartfelt thanks that we pay tribute to John for all that he did for his neighbors in Jefferson County. He was an example to all UGN volunteers and he will truly be missed."

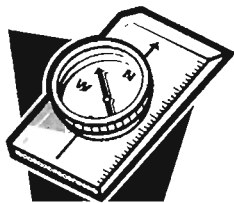
Coast Guard Auxiliary

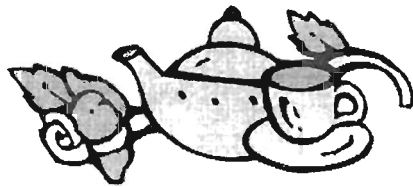
An Old-Fashioned English Afternoon Tea

Exquisite Junque Sale

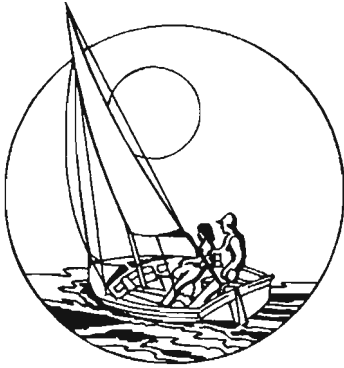

During the winter of 1943 the worst snowstorm of the century hit wartime Washington state. Bremerton was particularly hard hit which forced the closing of the shipyard and brought the city to a standstill. Most of the shipyard workers were stranded as all forms of transportation came to a halt. Barely a soul was able to move anywhere in the city. This is fact.

Kitsap County playwright Gwen Mansfield began with the snowstorm and created a heart-warming story called “Grace Diner.” The play opens in a downtown Bremerton diner as the storm begins on January 19th, 1943. Forced to wait out the storm are military and civilian travelers, regular customers, and the employees of Grace Diner who end up spending three long days together.

As the story unfolds we discover that the snowstorm has an impact, one way or another, on every one of their lives. As we learn more about this diverse collection of people we just might learn more about ourselves. As one character in the play says, “Once you’ve eaten at Grace Diner, your life will never be the same.”

Local resident Kerry Lyn Kelley is directing “Grace Diner” which opens **Thursday, May 13th** and runs through **Sunday, May 16th** at the Admiral Theatre in Bremerton.

“I have worked with Mansfield in the past when my husband, Dean, and I co-directed her in the part of Ethel in “On Golden Pond” performed by the Poulsbo Players at the Bay Club in the spring of 1994. Dean also directed one of Mansfield’s murder mysteries, “The Demise of Victoria Westerly” at Judith’s Tea Room in Poulsbo. Garden Tips

May is one of the busiest months for local gardeners. Plant, fertilize and prune are the key words for May. Scatter high-nitrogen fertilizer among bloomed-out spring flowering shrubs to support the summer's leaf, branch and bud growth. Fertilize long-flowering plants like annuals, begonias, fuchsias, geraniums and container plants. Continue to feed at monthly intervals throughout the summer. Plant perennials, annuals, herbs and warm season crops. Prune lilacs and rhodies to shape.

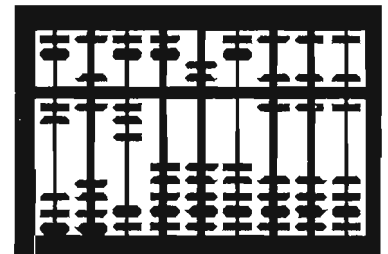

I have heard a number of expressed concerns with regard to ongoing maintenance and operations issues at the Port Ludlow Marina. I would like to take this opportunity to respond to any concerned customers.

Recently, Greg McCarry and Tom Griffin met with several residents and Port Ludlow Yacht Club (PLYC) members to discuss Marina issues. They decided that it is appropriate for form a Marina Advisory Committee (MAC) to facilitate information and issues between the owner and customers. The MAC will have 5 customer members including 2 PLYC members, one live-aboard member, and 2 Marina customers from the general population. Kori Ward, Tom Griffin and I will also represent ORM. Greg McCarry will participate in the first few meetings to kick off the process.

A number of issues will be on our plate including the following:

- Contract for a professional survey of the conditions and facilities by Bellingham Marine.
- Identify and prioritize maintenance issues.
- Review and make recommendations for contract lease provisions.
- Possible "additional insured" requirements.

Other planned projects include:

- Repair to the outside of E dock where water, flexing and age have corroded the connectors.
- Similar maintenance at the end of A dock.
- Upgrade the flotation to portion of docks which are low in the water.

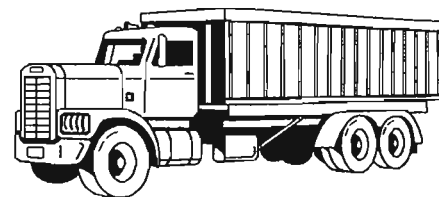
Report Speeding Gravel Trucks

A concern about the speed of gravel trucks traveling through our community was raised at the recent County Commissioners meeting held in Port Ludlow, April 6th. Ken Johnston, superintendent of Mats Mats Quarry, shares this concern and in a letter to residents pledges to help ensure our roadways are safe.

Johnston says, "I encourage you to please call my office any time you witness a gravel truck driving erratically or dangerously." He says if the truck was coming from or going to Mats Mats Quarry, he will speak to the driver about the safety of the community and, if necessary, refuse to sell them additional material.

To ensure that the driver causing the problem is properly identified, Johnston asks that you try and provide the date and time of the incident, the location, license number or name on the truck, or a good description of the vehicle. He can be reached at 437-2211.

Mats Mats Quarry is owned by Lone Star Northwest and has been criticized in the past by Port Ludlow residents for their apparent lack of concern for the rights of the residents of the surrounding community.

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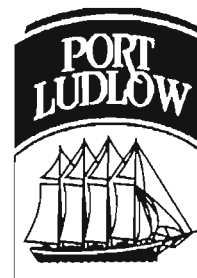

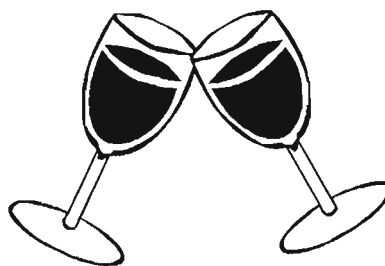

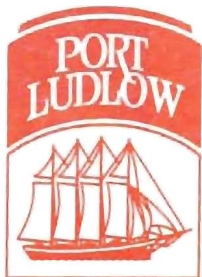
