



Strike a Blow for Port Ludlow

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The beauty of Port Ludlow, a Village in the Woods by the Bay, brought many of us here from distant states. When we visit our former homes and view rampant development, traffic and urban decay, we celebrate the decision we made to make our home here in such a beautiful spot.

In the next five years Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) is expected to leave the community. We don't want their holdings to fall into the hands of an owner who lacks the vision we have to maintain our beautiful home in perpetuity. An organization needs to be ready to cover the vacuum created by PLA's absence, assume ownership of the surrounding wooded and creekside areas and operate entities such as the water and sewer facilities.

The Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) is the only community-wide organization that can protect our surroundings for all of us. Lacking any taxing authority or means to obtain funds from residents, their only revenue sources currently are from sales of the telephone directory and vendor fees from the Friday Market. In 2002 this was supplemented by income from Port Ludlow Days. Unfortunately, due to insurance problems, this popular activity no longer can take place.

You now have an opportunity to help the PLVC raise funds to protect the future of Port Ludlow and to support their day-to-day activities. On November 19, the Sound Community Bank of Sequim began offering a VISA credit card to Port Ludlow residents. The purpose of this card, other than to make money for the bank, is to help support the PLVC. One percent of the gross proceeds will fund PLVC's operations.

PLVC needs funds to:

- Pay for expansion and upkeep of trails
- Support the community disaster services effort
- Support property and manage resources acquired from PLA (such as the Twin Islands)
- Support publication of the Port Ludlow Voice
- Pay for insurance
- Conduct elections and
- Support the myriad of other smaller activities in which the Village Council participates

Other communities that have implemented a revenue sharing type of credit card have had very successful experiences. Our community can be successful in this effort, too, if everyone pitches in and applies for and uses their card. The Village Council will receive \$25 for every qualified applicant plus one percent of all charge activity on the card. For those of you who already use a card to accumulate mileage, you could use this second card for some of your miscellaneous purchases. That's what I intend to do.

The card will feature a beautiful Port Ludlow scene designed by Joy Herring, one of our local artists. There is no annual fee for this card and the interest rate on unpaid balances, 25 days after the billing date, is a very favorable 10 percent.

Applications for the Port Ludlow credit card can be obtained at Coldwell Banker Realtors, Port Ludlow Property Sales, Dana Point Interiors, and at both the Bay and Beach Clubs. Applications can either be mailed to the bank in an attached envelope or taken to Marie Lytal at the Homer Smith Insurance office at the intersection of Oak Bay and Paradise Bay Roads in Port Ludlow.

Hatch Covers Stolen

Two-piece aluminum hatch covers on replacement pontoons for the Hood Canal Bridge were stolen last month in Kitsap County. The vandalized pontoons were floating in Gamble Bay when the theft occurred.

Two people, George J. Knutsen and Michael H. Mahle, have been apprehended. Knutsen, age 43, a Bremerton resident, has been tried for first-degree possession of stolen property. He was sentenced to six months for the crime but is serving one year because of a prior offense. Mahle, who has not gone to trial yet, resided on a boat in Port Gamble Bay but also had a Bremerton address. He is charged with first-degree theft. The intention was to sell the stolen materials, worth approximately \$300,000, as scrap.

According to Department of Transportation (DOT) Public Relations officer Scott Wilson, the perpetrators were found with the help of a savvy DOT maintenance crew member who noticed suspicious activity and recorded a vehicle license number. The crew supervisor, Dean Crawford, checked area scrap metal dealers following the theft and located some of the stolen goods near the Port of Tacoma. When caught, Knutsen and Mahle had eight hatch ring sets in their possession. The rings weigh about 50 pounds each and are worth \$3,000 a set.

The pontoons were replacement pontoons for the Hood Canal Bridge. They were previously used to replace the western half of the Bridge when it sank in 1979. They served as placeholders until a draw span was constructed and installed in 1982. The intent was to retrofit and use them permanently in addition to 14 new pontoons in the eastern part of the Bridge when it is replaced in 2006. The pontoons were inspected in July and found to be whole and in good shape. In addition to replacement costs, missing hatch covers could allow someone to fall into a 15-foot high pontoon. Pontoons also could fill with water and sink.

Lloyd Brown, of DOT, says the crime will not slow the reconstruction of the Hood Canal Bridge. However, remaking the hatch covers will be expensive. It is unknown whether the contractor's insurance will cover repair costs.

When the Lights go Out-It's Dark!

Power outages and flickering lights are uncommon to Port Ludlow residents; but when they occurred recently, comparisons to the New York area blackouts were brought out. It was very dark. A check with Puget Sound Energy (PSE) revealed that the longer outages were a result of downed trees and flying limbs during the windstorm. PSE noted that early storms could also result in water leaks in worn cables or shorts in electrical equipment. These can be readily identified and repaired.

How can you be prepared for this type of emergency? The State Emergency Management office and the Red Cross have published a Family Emergency Preparedness Plan booklet that is available through the Fire Department. Some steps to be ready for such an infrequent event include:

- For those with life-sustaining equipment in the home, consider having a small generator to provide electricity.
- Post phone numbers for information or emergency assistance near the phone. Remember help is available through Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue at 437-2236. Both Bay Club and Beach Club offices will also assist in getting help.
- To get information on the problem, call the PSE emergency number, 1-425-452-1234.
- Have an emergency kit at hand. Include flashlight and batteries, a battery-powered radio, and a wind-up clock.
- Unplug or turn off appliances and don't forget portable heaters.
- Close windows and drapes to conserve heat.

Fortunately lights do not go out often, but having no lights does afford the opportunity to step outside and really see the stars.

The total County campaign is at 26 percent or \$65,877 against a target of \$250,000. The large majority of the businesses have yet to report and solicitations are still underway. We believe that the total amount contributed should be significantly higher at the end of this month. Memories

Continuing thoughts from Floyd Thoren shared with staff writer Maureen Poole.

Looking toward the water as you drive or stroll along Oak Bay Road near the condominiums and Resort, it's hard to imagine much more than homes and trees. Quiet tranquility, broken only by an occasional truck lumbering along the road, is all we think of. This wasn't the case when Port Ludlow was booming. Back in the old days (the forties), with a population of only 500–600 residents, Port Ludlow had The Admiralty Hotel; a general store; a bustling, thumping, steaming mill (Puget Mill); and the Port Ludlow Café. As you drive through this area, imagine the commerce that was taking place in this mill town.

The mill's owners and managers, along with their customers, were busy in offices. Lumber trucks rumbled into town. Loggers were looking for a hearty meal, local farmers and mill workers were looking for entertainment and a drink, and ships' captains and crews were frequently in the harbor overnight. Where did they all head? And who greeted them?

Maud ran the Port Ludlow Café for as long as Floyd could remember. She had a greeting and smile for most, occasionally a harsh word if the crowd got rowdy. Happy for the warm reception and fun, the six-man pile-driving crew of the mill enjoyed their once- or twice-a-year visit. They made the rounds of mill locations, repairing the ferry landings. Hard working during the day and equally serious about entertainment in the evening, these six bachelors looked forward to a visit. They would keep the jukebox playing and the beer flowing. If you happened in on a night that Spud was in a jovial mood, you would catch a glimpse of someone eager to dance, and dance alone if he couldn't find a partner. Occasionally Maud would have her fill, and chase him out, but most of the time the place really jumped and she just kept the food, coffee and beer flowing.

Other customers who frequented what was often called "Maud's" were Ole Benson, his brother Martin, his friend Rueben, and the quarry boss. Cigar smokers and generous men, these fellows would work their way from one end of the bar to the other, blowing smoke rings, and buying a round for those lucky enough to be called their friends. On one occasion Ole and his brother, and a few other tall Norwegians, got into a skiff, rowed a few feet from the shore and proceeded to raise their oars and perform the Norwegian manual of arms. A sight to behold! Although there was no formal entertainment, the clientele provided their own. It's no wonder the remaining settlers think Port Ludlow has become a pretty quiet place. Current restaurants can't compare.

Workshop Meeting Highlights

Workshop meetings of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) were held October 16 and November 6. At the October 16 meeting, the Council voted to hold Workshop meetings monthly on the first Thursday with powers to approve legislation at the Workshops, and General Meetings to be held quarterly at the discretion of the Council. The next General Meeting will be **Thursday, January 15, 2004**, with a guest speaker familiar with the Hood Canal and Narrows Bridge construction projects.

The PLVC budget originally presented in October looked grim, with expenses outweighing income. A motion was passed to transfer funds totaling approximately \$1,120 from the dormant Village Social Committee into the general account. A committee was also formed to look into ways of generating additional funds to meet the increasing need from groups requesting financial support from the PLVC. At the November 6 Workshop meeting, Councilman and committee member Bill Schoenemann advised we still are coming up about \$1,500 short.

Rosalie Barber advised the insurance rates for the Farmers Market are projected to rise 40 percent—greatly cutting into their income. She also recommended the Market open later in the year and stay open throughout September to allow for late harvest of fruits and vegetables.

Dwayne Wilcox advised applications for the new co-bank credit cards to be offered by the PLVC would be available soon and that 30 have already been spoken for. PLVC will receive one percent of monies for sales of services and merchandise on the card that charges ten percent on unpaid balances. (See related story on page 1.) Also, since we are doing our own marketing of the card, we will receive \$25 per approved application. One of Joy Herring's paintings of Port Ludlow will be the picture on the card.

Randy Shelley's Future of Port Ludlow Committee announced at the November Workshop that they had completed documents necessary for the future transfer of the Twin Islands and Ludlow Creek from Port Ludlow Associates to the PLVC. Both the documents and transfer of properties were unanimously approved by the PLVC. Since Greg McCarry of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA)

Disaster Notes

New on the job, I will post a monthly article in the *Voice* to heighten our awareness of possible disasters and describe our preparedness. What is a disaster—an emergency? An emergency is any threat to life. A disaster is when a situation overwhelms the response resources. However, we have a substantial local, County and State disaster response organization to mitigate the consequences. I give credit for our well-established organization to Howard Morse who has moved to Florida (where there are no disasters except at the polls).

Consider Some Serious Possible Disasters

- 1. Long-term power loss: long periods (as has happened) with loss of heating, cooking, refrigeration, power for medical needs, etc., could be a serious disaster.
- Severe wind storms. Fallen trees in late October caused loss of power, loss of phones and 911 access, and shut down computers. A yacht overturned and sank in the Hood Canal and a sailboat was de-masted near Port Townsend. A more serious storm destroyed the Hood Canal Bridge in 1978 causing extended distress for the Peninsula.
- 3. Fire. The October fire south of Port Angeles devastated 925 acres. We also witnessed the California fire which destroyed over 3,000 homes (equals all of Port Ludlow). Our past summer, with no rain and very dry trees, posed an extreme danger to Port Ludlow. We were fortunate that no fire occurred.
- 4. Earthquake. A great fault under Whidbey Island has the potential for serious damage to Port Ludlow. While the probability is low, consequences could be devastating.
- 5. Tsunami. Low probability. However, we read that in 1700 a magnitude 9.0 earthquake off Vancouver Island triggered a tsunami that crossed the Pacific and sank a ship in Japan.
- 6. Winter Storm. Heavy snow could disrupt or stop all road travel for some time.

These are some of the risks. Our disaster response team is quietly, actively remaining prepared to assist as needs arise. Future articles will focus on each citizen's personal responsibility.

Consolidation of HOA Insurance Evaluated

Randall Shelley, Chairman of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Future of Port Ludlow Committee called together members of Port Ludlow homeowner associations (HOAs) on Thursday, October 23, to discuss ways to lower insurance costs for individual entities within Port Ludlow, including Villages and/or common areas. The meeting was held at the Port Ludlow Community Church with Homer Smith III of Homer Smith Insurance and Nancy Cannan of the Community Association Underwriters attending. Both represent firms insuring HOAs in Port Ludlow.

It was pointed out that larger associations have reduced rates for coverage. Nancy Cannan said the idea of a group master policy has come up quite often over the years, and some were successful. However, there are legal issues that make it difficult. "Insurable interest" areas being insured separately cannot come together solely to consolidate their insurance. They must each have ownership of the entire new area being insured.

Homer Smith pointed out the differences in types of HOAs, age, types of construction, whether past claims have been made, and needs of the associations can also create problems making merging difficult. However, he did point out there are some associations which could possibly join together if they could overcome legal hurdles.

It would not work to have condominium and singlefamily home associations merge because their needs are too divergent. It also became apparent in conversations among condo association representatives that it might be difficult to merge some of their associations.

The possibility of bringing South Bay associations under the umbrella of the South Bay Community was brought forward and compared to the North Bay LMC.

The conclusion was the idea is worth pursuing and a positive step for Port Ludlow as a community. Lynne Gauche of Teal Lake Village Homeowners Association, and Mason Rothenborg of Inner Harbor Village Condominium Association both volunteered to pursue the possibilities. A data base will be obtained from one of the realtors and Lynn will try to organize some of the smaller South Bay Villages into one new Village and/or joint ownership of these Villages' common areas into a new larger legallyinsurable geographic area. Mason will look into the possibility of consolidating any of the condominium associations with similar insurance needs into a large association.

Whose Bones: Archeologists Identify Human Remains

In August, excavation at the Hood Canal Bridge graving yard site in Port Angeles was halted by the discovery of Native American remains. There have been many archeological finds in the Pacific Northwest but this one, in our back yard, affects the reconstruction of the Bridge. What process takes place under these circumstances?

Both Federal (Federal and Indian lands) and State laws (all other lands) protects archeological sites and Native American graves from knowing disturbance on all lands in Washington State. The intent of the Native American and Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) of 1990 is to return Native American remains and artifacts to tribes with whom they are culturally affiliated. Removal or tampering with Native American remains is a class C felony.

According to Bill Kalina, Tribal Coordinator and Naval Magazine Cultural Resources Manager at Indian Island, inadvertent discovery of human remains at a construction site halts all work. The sheriff and coroner are called in to determine the time of death and eliminate the possibility of murder. The next step is a site survey and archeological assessment. Typically, artifacts are found with the remains that help identify the find. In the case of the Salish of Puget Sound, bones may be buried with cedar planks. In disturbed sites, such as construction sites, only bone fragments or teeth may remain. These can be subjected to osteological analysis including carbon 14 dating and DNA analysis. Use of both analyses depends on circumstances and tribal permission. Construction cannot go forward until site analysis is complete.

The goal always is to responsibly remove remains and repatriate them to the appropriate tribe, according to Allyson Brooks of the Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation. The process involves her office, the Washington Federal Highway Commission, the Department of Transportation, the Corps of Engineers and the Tribe. A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) is the plan for the procedure.

An archeological survey of the 22.4-acre graving yard site is being conducted. It has uncovered additional human remains and artifacts. An MOA with the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe will determine the repatriation of bones and artifacts.

LMC Board of Trustees Meeting

During the summer months, Arbor Wise, LLC, of Seattle, surveyed the 57 acres of Greenbelt. Ron Garton, Chair of the Greenbelt Committee, highlighted some of the survey findings: the group found the Greenbelt to be in overwhelmingly healthy condition. A number of weed varieties were identified including Japanese knotweed and Tansy Ragwort, which are classified as noxious. Fire risk is reported as similar to other communities threatened by fires this summer in Washington, Oregon and California.

Remedial recommendations are included in the report for the Committee's consideration. Garton said the Greenbelt Committee will work on setting priorities to deal with identified issues over the next several months. The survey did not identify any significant pest problem. It was noted that the recent caterpillar infestation is a cyclical phenomenon and, although disfiguring, does not cause any lasting damage. A copy of the 58-page report is available at the Beach Club for anyone interested in reading the full report.

Being mindful of budget constraints, the Operations Committee is setting priorities for capital improvements for Board and community approval. Jim Laker has been appointed to fill a vacancy on the Operations Committee.

The Trustees approved an agreement with Port Ludlow Vacations to allow guest use of the Beach Club facilities for Admiralty I and II condos in the rental pool. A fee of \$300 per bedroom will be charged for the 59 condos currently in the rental pool. Discussions are underway with Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) concerning facility use for Resort and Marina guests.

In other action, the Trustees unanimously approved an increase in the fees charged by the Architectural Control Committee for review of building plans. The fee for new construction will now be \$500 and a \$250 fee will be charged for additions made to existing buildings.

Greg McCarry, CEO of Port Ludlow Associates, was on hand to explain PLA's desire to transfer ownership of the Twin Islands to the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC). The financial burden (taxes and insurance) for the Islands was characterized as minimal and would be borne by the PLVC. The property would be maintained in its natural state in perpetuity. Local control was deemed to be more desirable than turning the property over to the County or a land trust. Following considerable discussion, the Trustees passed a resolution affirming the desirability of community ownership of the Twin Islands, and support for continuing discussions between PLA and PLVC concerning transfer of ownership. The resolution dealt exclusively with the Twin Islands-other properties earmarked for transfer to PLVC will be discussed at the appropriate time. 🕱

Wildlife Watch

My Christmas Grouse

It was lying right in front of me as I walked out my front door...a little pile of poop. "Oops—where's that cat," I thought. But as I looked up I caught a glimpse of a feathery tail disappearing around the front of the house, presumably across the driveway.

Curiously, cautiously, I followed it and as I peered around the corner I saw a rather nonchalant creature that glanced up at me and continued to move on. Making some puttputt-putt-putt-purrr sounds—like the throbbing of a distant motor boat—he carefully picked his way through the shrubs. A grouse! A beautiful Ruffed Grouse...distantly related to a partridge, a pear tree partridge...a Christmas pear tree partridge! How appropriate!

As he putt-putts his way through the garden I can't help but notice the dark-colored neck feathers that he spreads when he struts in front of the females. He is about the size of a bantam chicken and has a broad. flat tail.

His dappled feathering ranges in color from pale grey to a rich mahogany. (I find out from later research that his colors are related to his habitat: the dark colored grouse inhabit dark forest; grey grouse live in lighter bush. He feeds on insects, succulent vegetation, a variety of flowers, soft leaves, berries, and seeds. Clover is particularly attractive to the young ones. And the aforementioned droppings do definitely belong to this visitor!). So far, my special grouse has been lucky: hawks (and hunters, in some areas) take many as they feed along roads through the forest.

He's not a migratory bird, and once established, lives all his life within a few hectares.

His rich colors, large size, and the explosive burst with which he takes flight are distinctive. Living in hardwood bush and forest, his beak, legs, wings, and gut are adapted to permit him to feed as a browser on buds, leaves, and twigs. An excellent climber among slender branches and on thin, yielding stems, he is expert at short, rapid, twisting flights. He can actually hover and make complete turns in the air—all useful traits for flying through thick bush. However, he is essentially a ground-dwelling bird.

He is found wherever there are even small amounts of broad-leaved trees, especially poplars, birch and alders, which provide the buds and catkins that are its staple winter food. Interestingly, for us in this area, the deciduous trees, important as food and shelter to the Ruffed Grouse, frequently occur in the early stages as forests grow back after logging or forest fires. We should be seeing more...

Watching, I was a bit in awe. Here was this lovely creature, vulnerable yet majestic, choosing my garden to explore. It was as if at that moment the Christmas season seemed to officially begin for me with this unique cousin of a partridge. A pear tree partridge, of course. Janet Force is the Bay Club editor. SBCA Update

The regular monthly meeting of the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) Board of Directors was held at the Bay Club on October 24 with all Board members and several interested community representatives in attendance. The meeting scheduled for November 28 was cancelled because several Board members were to be out of town, and the December meeting has been moved to **Friday, December 19**.

Extensive discussion of the tennis courts took place. A draft plan for the SBCA to fund major maintenance on the three courts located near the Golf Clubhouse, with PLA reimbursing the SBCA over a 5- to 10-year period, was under consideration. That plan has now been deferred after learning that PLA could not agree to transfer ownership of the courts to SBCA at the end of that period. Efforts to find a sound and affordable solution are continuing.

The Board received a reply from the Jefferson County Commissioners concerning the installation of mooring buoys in Inner Harbor. The letter indicates that issuance of the permits was an oversight and that the permits have now been rescinded. The issue remains unresolved at this writing, with the holders of those permits appealing the Commissioners' decision.

Since the October Board meeting, installation of the new larger sound-reducing doors between the meeting rooms on the south side of the Bay Club has been completed. Roof repairs are largely complete except for a small leak found in the course of repairing the fallen tree damage. The trellis roof over part of the patio and some painting remain to be done. The Board very much appreciates the cooperation and patience of the groups that had to be moved and/or rescheduled while this work was done. Please check it out next time you are at the Bay Club, and

South Bay ARC Addresses Winter Emergencies

With the fall and winter storms come trees being blown over. This recently happened at the Bay Club and on several homeowners' properties. The Bay Club had some damage which has been repaired.

New Emergency Process

The South Bay Community Association Architectural Review Committee (SBCA–ARC) has put into place a new Emergency Tree Removal Procedure that will allow us to react quickly to a homeowner's concern for a tree coming down, causing property damage or injury.

Under normal circumstances the procedure has the homeowner fill out a permit request and give it to their Village ARC Representative who forwards it to the SBCA–ARC for review. This applies to any tree over six inches in diameter. The SBCA–ARC meets on the third Friday of the month and accepts applications through the third Tuesday of the month. Therefore, it could be one to four weeks before an application would be reviewed and a decision made.

The new expedited Emergency Procedure is for the situation where a tree needs to be removed now because it poses an imminent danger. In this situation, the homeowner contacts their Village ARC Representative and notifies him that they have an emergency. The application is then filled out by the homeowner and given to the SBCA–ARC by the Village ARC as quickly as possible. SBCA–ARC members will make an on-site inspection and determine if a permit is to be issued. If the permit is approved, the homeowner is given a verbal okay to remove the tree as soon as possible. The written permit and letter will follow shortly. The permit for the removal will be issued within one to two weeks.

Permits Required For Satellite Dishes

Many homeowners are getting their TV signal from satellite providers (i.e. DISH or DIRECTV). Remember that you need a permit for installing the satellite dish on your house. The Village ARC Representative will issue you a permit and help determine the placement of the dish on your house. The installer may want to put the dish in the place he can get it done quickly. However, there may be a preferable location where reception is just as good and the dish is less visible.

Developer Report

Olympic Terrace—Record Turnout

On November 7, PLA invited Port Ludlow residents to an open house tour to view our latest project and three new, decorated model homes. Over 250 owners responded to the invitation. Two special features of the project included large, wooded lots and a detached "Quinault Cottage." The response was overwhelming in turnout and lots of compliments on the new plans. Thanks to all of you who made the trek. If you missed the event, the models will continue to be open each weekend...you're always welcome to drop by.

New Home Sales at Recent Records

As we close out 2003 we are able to report significant improvement in the pace of new home sales compared to the previous five-year period. For the new home construction and sales, we will close the year with 40 new homes and lots delivered to customers. Another encouraging sign is that all the Ludlow Bay Village townhomes that are under construction have been sold including the latest two-unit building. Some of the sales will not close until completion of construction so they are not counted in the 40 deliveries mentioned earlier. Most new home purchasers come from the greater Puget Sound area (about 60 percent) and the remaining mostly from the West Coast. This year we have seen a rising number of new residents from the Midwest and the East—and even a new resident from Bremerton.

There was also very high activity in the resale home business as well as many new homes built by owners on their own lots.

Marina and Golf Course

In 2002, Marina occupancy dipped to 83 percent and will finish this year in the low 90 percent range. The Marina also benefited from a record sunny summer phenomenon that generated many visitors from other marinas.

Golf continues to be a challenging environment with increased competition and aggressive pricing. While member rounds increased for the year, outside fee play is still a focus of our business. For 2003 we will have spent significantly more in maintenance over previous years and we are establishing a fund to replace the Pro Shop. By the end of 2003 we will have accumulated \$500,000 in the fund.

Village Center

Earlier in the year PLA offered the Village Center for sale and several offers were received. One was accepted but failed to close and other offers did not produce the desired value for the buildable areas in the Center. PLA has removed the property offering and will retain ownership of the Village Center for the foreseeable future. That also means that PLA will continue to host the Recycle Center for now.

Resort Expansion

PLA's response on the scoping issues for the Resort EIS should be delivered to Jefferson County by the end of December. A great deal of work has gone into working out issues identified in the public hearings. We continue to look forward to completing this process for permitting by early next year.

Hospitality Business

For the hospitality business PLA has experienced growing demand for the year as the economy stabilized and local travel has increased. Many guests and groups are coming from the greater Puget Sound region rather than longer distance travel. The business still has much room for improvement to get back to pre-911 levels but we are encouraged that the trend is in the right direction.

Clarification from Future of Port Ludlow Committee

Randy Shelley, Chairman of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Future of Port Ludlow Committee, has clarified that Committee's position regarding future ownership of Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) assets, namely Olympic Water and Sewer (OWSI) and the Twin Islands, once the Developer exits the community.

In a letter to The Leader responding to Barney Burke's article of November 12 that referred to OWSI ownership, Shelley said, "The Committee believes that it would be presumptuous for it to make such a recommendation. Rather, we have identified the two options which we believe have support in the community." These options are 1) purchase by Public Utility District (PUD) #1, or 2) ownership by a public entity formed by Port Ludlow residents. Outlining preliminary steps to determine the will of the residents Shelley concluded, "At present this is all moot since we are informed that Port Ludlow Associates will not be ready to sell for a number of years."

Shelley further pointed out that PLA has discussed giving, not selling, the Twin Islands to the PLVC saying, "The Village Council, a non-profit Washington Corporation, is the only community-wide entity in Port Ludlow capable of such ownership."

Rules of Golf

The new Rules of Golf are about to be published. Every four years, the Rules are reviewed by the United States Golf Association and the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews. This newest version of the Rules (to be released within the next few weeks) will have numerous changes in content, language, and format. Besides some of the actual rules changes, the readability and ease of understanding for this version has been improved substantially. I know that you want to hear what has changed, so here are just a couple of new wrinkles...

- There is no longer an automatic penalty in either match play or stroke play if a ball off the putting green moves after a loose impediment within a club length of the ball has been removed.
- A golfer may now use any means to remove loose impediments from his/her line of putt, provided nothing is pressed down.

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





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
